FACILITY DOGS: BRINGING COMFORT & HEALING TO MANY

At Patriot PAWS, no dog is ever a failure, even if he or she is not successful as a service dog candidate. We believe that every dog has a purpose suited to their individual personality and strengths, and we make every effort to help them find their place in the world.

Perhaps one of the least known of our career-change dogs is the facility dog, a dog who works alongside humans who provide a particular service to other humans. Meet Woody and Jester, two facility dogs who have definitely found their place in the world.

The mission of Project Harmony, located in Omaha, Nebraska, is "To protect and support children, collaborate with professionals and engage the community to end child abuse and neglect." Children who have been removed from traumatic situations are typically frightened and confused and may find it hard to trust adults, which is why Woody, a big, lovable English Golden Retriever, was placed to comfort these children and help them deal with their current situation. According to Angela Roeber, Director of Communications, "Woody is the best dog ever and has touched so many lives in the past year he has been with us. I cannot imagine our work without him. I don't know if all those who had a part in Woody's upbringing and training even realize the impact and healing he has brought to so many children as well as adults. Words cannot express our sincere appreciation. Woody has such a strong intuition for who needs him most. When not in a forensic interview or therapy session, he seeks out those in our waiting area and even staff who could benefit from his support. He puts his paw on them as if to say, 'I'm here for you. I care about you. I love you.' And then he snuggles up beside them for as long as time will allow. Woody and those at Patriot PAWS are a true blessing."

Facility dogs don't only work with children, though. The mission of 3 For The Love (3FTL), located in Dallas, Texas, is "To bridge the gap between mental illness treatment and recovery, as we work together to reduce the mental health stigma." 3FTL works primarily with First Responders to help them deal with the traumatic events they have experienced while on the job. Patriot PAWS placed Jester, an English Cream Retriever, with Jennifer Halley, Owner and Treatment Coordinator, to aid in their work. "Jester has an unbelievable ability to detect an increase in emotions, specifically anxiety, and will give all his love to the First Responders that need him in their most vulnerable times, specifically when speaking about their trauma. I've witnessed his work during mass casualty debriefings, zeroing in on First Responders who might need extra love. He's even climbed in a First Responder's lap as they were describing their experience with the traumatic event. During intake, he will rest by their feet and let them pet him as they work through the most serious aspects of their jobs. When we are visiting firehouses or police stations, he carries around his toys, waiting for someone to play with him. He is always smiling!! I am continually amazed at how much love and joy he brings to everyone he sees. We are so blessed and grateful to have Jester as part of 3FTL."

Although 2020 is turning out to be anything but a normal year, the good news here at Patriot PAWS is that, through it all, we have continued with our mission of training service dogs for disabled veterans.

As the pandemic unfolded, some difficult decisions had to be made, including furloughing part of the staff and temporarily discontinuing all volunteer work on campus. Although the admin building was closed, administrative matters were

handled by staff from home. The kennels remained open, though, with a handful of dedicated staff and our awesome veterinarian, Dr. Rhonda Phillips, caring for and training the dogs who were housed there. Both our Dallas-Fort Worth area and Texas A&M volunteer puppy raisers continued to care for and train their assigned dogs, and our inmate trainers continued to train the dogs in their care at the prisons. Our two cats, Eli and Leo, were temporarily moved to the isolation wing of the kennels which was lovingly dubbed "kitty city" for the duration.

After the governor here in Texas began to reopen our state in phases, Patriot PAWS reopened when allowed, first with

staff only, then later with a controlled number of volunteers on campus at any one time, and always while observing CDC protocols for the safety of everyone present.



The old adage, "when the going gets tough, the tough get going", is as true now as ever. These past few months have seen everyday people step up and become heroes, putting others before self and restoring our faith in humanity. But the unprecedented blow to our economy has negatively impacted donations to non-profits, and Patriot PAWS is no exception. Scheduled demos and events, both major components of our fundraising, were canceled or postponed for the foreseeable

future, and monetary donations remain greatly diminished. Now, more than ever, we are grateful for each and every dollar that we receive in support of our mission. We must never forget that today's disabled veterans were yesterday's "tough" who "got going" when our country needed them.

Although our April graduation had to be postponed, we were able to continue placing dogs as social companions.
